INTRODUCTION

Ysgol Bryn Alyn is a co-educational community comprehensive day school for pupils aged 11-16. Pupils are drawn primarily from 7 local primary/junior schools: Gwersyllt Junior, Ysgol Heulfan, St. Mary's, Brymbo, Tanyfron C.P., Black Lane C.P, Pentre Broughton, Ysgol Penrhyn, New Broughton and Brynteg C.P. School. An increasing number of pupils opt for the school from other areas. The number on roll is presently 701. The school occupies purpose-built accommodation with specialist provision for science, design and technology, P.E., music, information technology and modern languages. Teaching is through the medium of English.

THE MOVE FROM PRIMARY SCHOOLS

Care for our pupils begins in the primary schools. The Year 7 Achievement Coordinator, Mrs L. Jones, visits the primary/junior schools attended by each pupil who will transfer to the school at the beginning of the new school year. During the visits the Year 6 pupils meet current Bryn Alyn pupils and find out about life in Bryn Alyn. They come to the school on a day visit and meet their tutors and the teachers who are going to teach them. All the pupils in Year 6 are involved in a range of transition activities across a number of curriculum areas.

YEAR GROUPS

It is important that each pupil feels a sense of belonging. The school is divided into five year groups. Each year is led by an Achievement Coordinator who works closely with a team of form tutors. New pupils from the primary schools will be in Year 7 with their Achievement Coordinator Mrs L. Jones, who they will have already met through previous visits.

FORM GROUPS

On entry into the school in September, incoming pupils are placed in form groups. Each of these groups is the responsibility of a form teacher and they also form the teaching groups for some subjects. Pupils needing extra help with English, Mathematics and Science will be taught in smaller groups. The Achievement Co-ordinator for Year 7, who arranges the groups, ensures that there is a balance in terms of gender and ability. We also ensure that a number of pupils from the same school are placed in each group. In this way, no pupil will be isolated from his or her previous school friends.

YEAR HEADS (ACHIEVEMENT COORDINATORS)

The Achievement Coordinators are responsible for the oversight of the academic progress and welfare of pupils and discipline within their year. Regular meetings are held with Form Teachers to discuss any problems that may have arisen. Each member of the Leadership Group has oversight of a number of year groups and may be called in for their advice.



REPORTS AND PARENTS' EVENINGS

All pupils will receive an annual full written report, issued in accordance with National Curriculum guidelines. This report will reflect your son/daughter's attendance, attainment and behaviour. A Parents' Evening is provided for each year group, where parents will have an opportunity to discuss in detail their son's/daughter's progress with the subject teachers. However, parents are most welcome to contact the school at any time to arrange an appointment to discuss a pupil's progress.

SCHOOL AIMS

The Education Reform Act, 1988, specifies that a balanced and broadly based curriculum should be provided by schools which:-

'promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils in the schools and of society; and prepares such pupils for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of adult life.'

This means for the school that the following are important:

CARING

To know our pupils as individuals with strengths, weaknesses, interests and ambitions.

ENVIRONMENT

To have an orderly, caring and purposeful environment, and a sense of responsibility within it.

BEHAVIOUR

To make sure that there is courteous behaviour and respect for the individual in the way that pupils behave.

OPPORTUNITY

To value each pupil equally and to provide for all our pupils an entitlement to broad and balanced studies.

STANDARDS

To encourage pupils to reach the highest possible standards in all that they do.

TEACHING

To encourage high quality teaching, which stimulates the individual, and to promote the highest standard of teacher development.

PREPARATION

To help prepare our pupils for the opportunities and responsibilities of adult life.

MORAL AND PERSONAL VALUES

To help foster a sense of individual worth and to give them an appreciation of the wide variety of attitudes and values within a multicultural society.

Our success as a school is based on the development, and subsequent maintenance, of an effective partnership between pupils, their parents and staff. A number of strategies have been developed to support this partnership, including the provision of newsletters and regular opportunities for parents to visit the school to fulfil their role as co-educators. We also place great emphasis on the use of the Personal Organiser, which provides a means of monitoring pupils' progress.

Further details relating to this partnership are set out within our Home School Agreement, which is issued on admission to the school.

The PTA

The Parent Teacher Association meets regularly as a means of providing information about the school's activities. In addition to the support of school functions, the PTA organises social activities to raise funds for the school, including an annual Bingo Night.

The parents of all pupils are automatically members of the PTA. Further details are available from the Chairperson, Mr. W. Beddoes, at the school.

LUNCHTIME ARRANGEMENTS

Pupils in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 may not leave the site, unless they are required to return home for a meal. **Pupils in Year 11** may only leave the site with their parents' permission. Parents are reminded that they retain responsibility for their son's / daughter's safety and conduct whilst he/she is off site. All pupils who leave the site at lunchtime must carry a lunch pass, which must be available for inspection by staff. **In the interests of safety, parents are encouraged to withhold permission for their son/daughter to leave the site.**

THE PERSONAL ORGANISER

A Personal Organiser is given to each pupil on entry to the school. It helps communication between home and school. Parents are asked to check and sign it each week.

If a pupil loses their organiser, a replacement can be bought.

ILLNESS IN SCHOOL

If your child feels unwell in school, they should see the staff in the school office who will assess the pupil and decide on a course of action. The school has a number of qualified first aiders on site. It is important to your contact details up to date in case of emergency.

MOBILE PHONES

The use of mobile phones is not permitted in school. If you wish your child to have a phone for emergency use it should be switched off. Any pupil seen using a phone will have it confiscated until the end of the day. If you need to contact your child please do so via the school office.

The school takes all reports of bullying very seriously. We investigate all incidents of bullying, no matter what form they take, and take appropriate action to respond discreetly and sensitively to both the needs of the victim and the bully.

Skills Challenge Certificate

This qualification was introduced into our school curriculum in September 2016, and is studied by KS4 students. It is an overarching qualification based on the core curriculum, followed by all students and Options chosen to meet their individual needs.

TEACHING METHODS

A variety of groupings are used, but setting is the most frequently employed method.

A variety of teaching styles are utilised, dependent on the subject, age and ability of the pupils, including teacher-led activities, individual and group work. The importance and use of personal research is continually underlined.

CURRICULUM ASSESSMENT AND EXTERNAL EXAMINATIONS

All pupils are continually assessed as part of normal classroom practice and in line with the National Curriculum assessment procedures.

In addition, class based tests or full internal examinations are set as necessary. In Year 11, pupils have the opportunity to sit examinations at G.C.S.E. level (General Certificate of Secondary Education) and at Entry Level. Parents are informed in advance of G.C.S.E. coursework requirements and the date by which pupils must complete work for assessment. Following consultation with parents and pupils, the school will decide on the examination subjects to be taken by each pupil.

THE TEACHING OF WELSH

Ysgol Bryn Alyn recognises that the Welsh language and its related culture are of significance to schools in Wales. Therefore, the school follows and supports the procedures as laid down in the National Curriculum relating to the teaching of Welsh as a second language. The school also fosters the involvement of staff and pupils with Welsh culture through Eisteddfodau, the Urdd and Glan Llyn and generally encourages learning experiences which give pupils contact with our Welsh heritage. This supports, extends and enriches the entitlement each pupil in the school has to all aspects of the National Curriculum. All pupils in KS3 and KS4 follow a course in Welsh.

ADDITIONAL NEEDS

Children who have learning or emotional / behavioural difficulties have an 'Additional Need'. This may also include pupils who have physical and/or sensory difficulties. The school aims to meet the needs of all pupils with Special Educational Needs, either throughout or at any time during their school career. Such pupils are given the greatest possible access to a broad and balanced education including the National Curriculum. Normally the needs of most pupils will be met in mainstream lessons, but occasionally pupils may be withdrawn to receive support. The knowledge, views and experience of parents are always sought so that there is the greatest possible degree of partnership between parents, children and the school. This support may extend to appropriate access arrangements for GCSEs and other assessments. The school staff also work closely with outside agencies to maximise the support available. Extra support for some pupils is provided by classroom assistants, in line with the statutory Individual Education Plans. For further information about the above please contact Miss Corfield.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

Religious Education is taught as a separate subject to all pupils in years 7,8 and 9 and is part of their National Curriculum entitlement. In years 10 and 11 Religious Studies is offered as an examination subject. In addition, all pupils follow a statutory course in Religious Education. All courses follow guidelines laid down by the Standing Advisory Council for Religious Studies.

Collective worship is arranged through the school's assembly programme and during tutorial sessions.

RECORD OF ACHIEVEMENT

At the end of Year 11 all pupils will receive a document that records their achievements both in and out of school. It includes information about abilities in schoolwork, involvement in school life, out of school interests and activities, personal and social skills and work experience. The ROA seeks to show a balanced picture of a pupil's development over the previous two years. Pupils are given considerable responsibility for its preparation. The aim will be for pupils to take a more active part in their own learning. In Year 11 pupils use computer software as a means to further develop their responsibility for the finished document, which is presented to the pupil on his /her final day in school

CAREERS GUIDANCE

Making the right choice about careers is very important. Pupils are encouraged to use the website www.careerswales.com to research their career ideas, option choices and job opportunities. A careers adviser from Careers Wales supports the school's careers curriculum, and every Year 11 pupil is offered an in depth interview to discuss his/her future. There is a comprehensive careers programme for Years 8, 9, 10 and 11 as part of the curriculum. Additional careers information is also available in the school library and JED (Job Explorer Database) software is available on the school's computer network.

An integral part of this guidance is a Work Experience placement in the Autumn term for all pupils in Year 11.

SEX EDUCATION

The school's policy on sex education, and the content of the course, has been reviewed and accepted by the Governing Body. Sex education is taught within a moral framework in the Personal and Social Education course, which is ongoing from Year 7 to Year 11. The programme is also supported and complemented in subject areas, particularly in Science and Child Development. The content of the course also fulfils National Curriculum requirements in areas such as Health Education. Details of the course are available in school. A parent may choose to withdraw his/her child from the elements of the sex education programme which are not part of the National Curriculum.

POLICY DOCUMENTS AND SCHEMES OF WORK

Under the Education Act, parents have the right of access to all school policy documents and schemes of work. Please contact the Headteacher should you wish to see any of these documents. All policies will be available on the school website.

CHILD PROTECTION

The all Wales Child Protection procedures make it clear that schools have an important role to play in the protection of children against abuse. This is confirmed by Local Safeguarding Childrens' board, which set the necessary action to be carried out by staff. Ysgol Bryn Alyn therefore has a duty to refer any concerns about the wellbeing of pupils to the Safeguarding and Support Department for further advice.

SPORT

The school aims to provide pupils in all years with access to competitive, creative, OAA and HRE activities from the KS 3 Programme of Study in line with the National Curriculum for Wales. Within KS 3 pupils experience a wide range of activities such as football, rugby, netball, badminton, swimming, gymnastics and Dance. During the summer term pupils take part in Athletic activities, Tennis, Rounders /Softball and Cricket. To promote Health and Wellbeing all pupils participate in a variety of Health Related activities which encourages them to focus on their own healthy lifestyle.

In KS4 the school provides one statutory PE lesson for all pupils but there is the opportunity for pupils to further their interest by choosing to take PE at examination level. Pupils who wish to study at this level will have three more lessons per week and this allows them to develop the theoretical and practical aspects of PE.

The school has extensive facilities including the Gwyn Evans Sports Hall, swimming pool, gymnasium, rugby and football playing fields, and a floodlit Multi Use Games Area. The school encourages pupils to take part in competitive team games for example Football, Rugby, Cricket, Tennis, Rounders and Netball. The school also promotes participation in other sporting activities such as Gymnastics and Athletics. Many of the pupils who compete in these activities have the opportunity to further represent Wrexham, North East Wales and Wales. There have been many pupils who have gained honours at these levels.

The 5x60 Programme which is supported by WAG and the SCFW is an initiative which allows a secondary school to offer an enhanced programme that compliments the curriculum as well as promote life long activities. This allows pupils to see sport beyond the school curriculum and develop not only new skills through other activities but encourages them to take on other roles within sport. Past pupils have developed their leadership skills as well as coaching roles through the opportunity that 5x60 has offered. The programme will also develop new and exciting ways of attracting pupils into physical activities who may not have discovered their area of interest.

PUPIL VOICE

The Welsh Assembly Government (WAG) believes that all children and young people have the right to be safe, happy and healthy, and to develop their skills and potential through education.

In order that pupils can make such a contribution to society, they need to be engaged in the decision –making process of their schools and community. At Ysgol Bryn Alyn there are a number of groups that form our 'Pupil Voice'.



ATTENDANCE

Parents have a legal duty to make sure that their children are properly educated. Regular attendance means that pupils should be in school from Monday to Friday during the hours of 8.50am - 3.20pm. If your child is ill and unable to attend, please ring the school office on 01978 720700 and ask to report the absence.

Please note that absence is not an automatic right but is granted at the discretion of the Headteacher. Holiday forms are available from your child's Achievement Coordinator; however we recommend that holidays are taken during the statutory holiday periods.

Absence is monitored very closely by the Pastoral Team, Attendance Officer and the Educational Social Worker based in school. We expect all pupils to achieve a minimum 95% attendance. We operate a 'first day contact system' which is designed to improve irregular attendance.

Lateness is not acceptable and is carefully monitored. Late arrival to class causes unnecessary disruption to the learning of others. Students who are late twice in a week will be issued with an hour's detention after school.

THE LIBRARY

The school library is a newly refurbished large and airy space managed by Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Perrin, whose aim is to provide a comfortable working environment conducive to research, reading and quiet study.

The library can accommodate thirty pupils sitting at the tables, twelve at the soft seating areas and fifteen at the computer suite.

The library contains an up to date stock of books to support both curriculum needs and leisure reading. There is also a variety of popular magazines and newspapers.

Pupils can visit the library during morning break and lunchtimes. New Year 7 pupils will be invited to a library induction session at the start of term where they can learn all about their library and what it can offer them. Pupils of all ages are encouraged to join various book clubs, quiz teams and often get to meet with visiting children's authors.

Teaching staff can also book their class into the library when they need to use our resources.

MUSIC

The school has a thriving Music Department, the results of which can be seen and heard at regular concerts, workshops, School Eisteddfod and productions.

Instrumental lessons are delivered by peripatetic staff from the Wrexham Music Service. These include:

We are one of the few secondary schools who still offer this service for free. A limited number of instruments are available from the school and county. However, once you've experienced some tuition in your chosen instrument, then it's recommended that you buy your own. Payment schemes are available to aid families with this.

Every year, pupils learning to play an instrument are given the opportunity to take external examinations. Each pupil will be expected to take part in the relevant school and County ensembles. These include choir, brass / strings and woodwind bands, a school Samba band and drum/guitar and keyboard club.

These excellent opportunities enable you to develop essential key skills such as communication, working with others and enhancing individual performance. It's an excellent way to settle in to your new environment and meet new friends.

The Music curriculum at Bryn Alyn looks at various topics, concentrating on composing, performing and appraising. Every pupil will gain instrumental and vocal skills through their music lessons, developing their communication skills and generally boosting their confidence - attributes which are highly valued in today's world of work. We are proud of our busy and successful department, and in the words of a current pupil:
