Your right to request a meeting with the school's governing body

The Schools Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 removed the requirement for school governing bodies to hold an annual meeting with parents. Instead, new arrangements were introduced to enable parents to request up to 3 meetings in any school year with the governing body, on matters which are of concern to them. If parents wish to use their rights under the Act to hold a meeting, four conditions will need to be satisfied:

1. Parents will need to raise a petition in support of holding a meeting.

The parents of at least 30 registered pupils will need to sign the petition. If it is a paper petition, then a parent's written signature must be given as well as the name and class of each of their children who are registered pupils at the school. If the petition is in electronic format, the 'signature' required is the typed name of the parent plus the name and class of each child who is a registered pupil at the school and the email address of each parent who 'signs' the electronic petition.

2. The meeting must be called to discuss matters which affect the school.

The meeting cannot be called to discuss such matters as the progress of individual pupils, or to make a complaint against a member of the school's staff or governing body. The petition should contain brief details of the matter or matters to be discussed, and the reasons for calling the meeting. This information should be clearly displayed at the top of the petition, with parents' signatures appearing below.

3. A maximum of 3 meetings can be held during the school year.

The law allows parents to use their rights to request up to 3 meetings with a school governing body during the school year.

4. There must be at least 25 school days left in the school year.

The law makes it a condition that at least 25 school days are left in the school year when the petition is received so that the meeting can be held. A "school day" means a day when the school is open to pupils: it does not include weekends, public holidays, school holidays or INSET days.

We have excellent relationships with our feeder schools and enjoy regular contact through curricular and pastoral links. We provide an enhanced transition programme for those pupils who need extra support and guidance with the transition to secondary school. We held Year 5/6 Extravaganza days in September 2023 to support the transition work. Here pupils from primary school took part in Faculty lead activities (including Spanish language activities, Street Dance, Rocket Launching and problem solving). It was a great opportunity for our pupils to meet some of our staff and take part in an event on the school grounds.

Although, they could not mix with other primaries, they met other pupils visually, at a distance. All of the pupils had an excellent day, and were very excited about going to YBA in the future.' Black Lane also commented further on transition activities

'YBA ensure that our pupils are supported well with transition to secondary school. Our pupils feel connected and know who key members of staff are. They are well informed about key information and expectations of YBA and know they can talk about any questions they have at any time. Key information about the needs of individuals and their families is passed on so that provision can be put in place to support a smooth transition.'



The Additional Learning Needs department ran an Afasic periodduring the summer term for pupils in Year 6 who require additional academic support. This time allowed pupils to come to YBA over a number of days and then into the CTD where we created 'butterflies of belonging' with notes of their hopes and dreams now displayed down our Expressive Arts corridor. It will serve as a reminder to them for their next 5 years.

We have continued to develop our links with the local community by producing a bi-annual 'cluster newsletter' in conjunction with the primary schools. The

newsletter includes news and events from the local resource centre, Alyn Waters Country Park and Gwyn Evans Sports Centre as well as the Primary Schools.

<u>Attendance</u>

At Ysgol Bryn Alyn we are committed to providing a full and effective education to all pupils and we embrace the concept of equal opportunities for all.

For a child to reach his/her full educational achievement a high level of school attendance is essential. The school works consistently towards a goal of 100% attendance for all children. Every opportunity is used to convey to pupils and their parents or carers the importance of regular and punctual attendance.

Attendance has been a challenge for both school and parents since the COVID pandemic. However, following Welsh Government guidance we work with parents to ensure the best possible attendance for all students.

Our target for attendance is 96% and our attendance officer is in daily contact with families for those pupils who do not attend school. We monitor pupil attendance each lesson and follow up on pupils who do not attend ensuring that both pupils and parents/carers are supported with targeted interventions where necessary.

We are delighted that our collaborative work with parents/carers is demonstrating a positive trend in YBA Attendance statistics. Communication is strong due to our EDULINK App where parents/ carers can easily report absences. We continue to work with parents/carers to encourage medical appointments and holidays are taken during holiday time (where possible) altering our parent information to include the impact of absences on their child.

Information is regularly sent out to parents regarding attendance and the importance of it. Individual and group work to encourage 'belonging' at YBA is a focus for our Family Engagement Officer and our Youth Workers. Heads of Year work hard to engage with pupils who find attending school difficult and signpost appropriate interventions where needed.

From January 2024 we had a form time attendance focus, hoping to continue to foster excellent relationships in our community so that our pupils want to belong to us!

As an example of attendance work completed in 2023—2024, there was a specific focus on the year to date 80 – 90% pupils in January 2024. Form tutors were asked to mentor a small group of targeted pupils in their class and meet with them weekly. To focus the discussions, a google form was completed by the member of staff in collaboration with the pupil after each meeting.

Data outcomes from this focus

137 pupils were targeted by form tutors across the school. They have been discussing and monitoring the targeted pupil's attendance across two half terms.

Half term 3 = 96/137 pupils improved their % attendance (70%)

Of specific note, Year 10 tracking showed an 81% improvement across the targeted year group (only 6 did not improve and had valid reasons).

Overall for Year 10 attendance, the % gap between girls and boys in Year 10 narrowed by 0.6%

The pastoral team agreed that this focus should continue with the same targeted pupils for Half Term 4.

Half term 4 = 47/137 continued to improve their % attendance (66%)

Whole school attendance between January and May increased by 0.4% and unauthorised attendance dropped by 0.3% Alongside this focus, our ESW delivered assemblies to all year groups about his role and why attendance to school is vital to their futures. The YBA attendance team sends out 'nudges' via EDULINK at 7am every morning to every pupil, helping to ensure a daily reminder of importance if attending school. Examples of the 7am attendance nudges...



Across our FoS, YBA is joint second for attendance.



100% Attendance

Pupils are awarded certificates half termly for achieving 100% attendance. If they go on to achieve 100% attendance at the end of a full term, then they are awarded a coloured 100% attendance badge and they are put into a prize draw. Improvement in attendance is also celebrated. We are also focusing on attendance improvers so that every pupil has the chance to achieve.







<u>Rewards</u>

There are a number of awards that pupils can strive for over the academic year. These include teacher nominated 'Star Awards' for pupils working hard in their lessons (awarded every half term), Mrs Slinn gives out Headteacher Awards every half term for those pupils who are top of the leader board with Achievement Points. These are pupils who play an active part in our YBA community, demonstrating our REACH values and being an exemplary YBA citizen.

Our REACH Awards – are presented in Celebration assemblies at the end of the academic year. These awards are based on our REACH values and pupils are nominated by teaching staff, Heads of Year and SLT. We continue with our 'On Tour' REACH awards for all year groups. Heads of Year, some subject staff/form tutors and SLT 'dropped in' as a surprise to pupil homes to present them with their exemplary YBA award (check out our On Tour video on our YouTube channel by clicking here)

Resilience (HoY nominated),

Effort - 86 nominations

Aspiration 79 nominations

Co-operation 88 nominations

Honour (nominated by HoY and SLT).

268 pupils were nominated across all 5 categories in the academic year 2023 - 2024. All nominees

received a certificate and winners (those pupils with the most votes) received specially designed certificates, and YBA stationary, as our school minibus drove around the community in convoy. This 'alternative' reward ceremony continues to be well received by our YBA community and it is a fitting end for staff to thank our pupils for the effort they have put in.


Pupil Surveys

We continually strive to find out how our pupils are feeling about school, either verbally or through pupil questionnaires. During this academic year our pupils have completed the PASS survey. The success of young people's educational experience is heavily determined by the attitudes that they bring to their learning, their sense of aspiration and the feelings they have about their place in the broader social context of the school. The PASS diagnostic is multi-factorial measure of student attitudes to school, learning and success. Its robust nature enables the data it yields to be used as a means of establishing baselines and to support effective planning, implementation and evaluation of interventions at individual, group and whole school levels This data is allowing Heads of Year to signpost relevant interventions for individuals. PASS supports YBA to

- Establish our students' perceptions of their school and learning experience;
- Help teaching staff, support staff and senior leaders to challenge their own assumptions about the school and its students;
- Respond to improvement needs as identified by the students;
- Inform teaching and learning strategies and intervention programmes to help raise standards of attainment and student well-being;
- Address challenging behaviour
- Address attendance issues through the identification of underlying factors as well identifying those most risk at of becoming alienated;
- Support emotionally vulnerable young people and those with possible mental health issues, to ensure those most at risk do not slip through the net;
- Provide an objective means for joint collaborative problem-solving, working with parents, carers and extended families, external agencies and other professionals supporting young people.


Pupils have also completed wellbeing surveys to continue to ensure that YBA is responding to pupil needs and has an opportunity to listen to individual pupil voice. See examples (right)

These help YBA to ensure that the appropriate actions are put in place for improvement, especially following the Statutory Framework from Welsh Government on Emotional Health and Wellbeing





We are also a MyHappyMind School, having piloted this approach to Emotional Health and Wellbeing with Year 7, focused on transition. The content has been delivered to Year 7 during form time as well as staff accessing the wellbeing support for them.



Pastoral Support

Ysgol Bryn Alyn prioritises the pastoral support of our pupils. Our Pastoral care begins with our form tutors in their dedicated time at the start of each day. This provides our pupils with clear routines to set them up for the day. Through Form Slides and assemblies, we continue to signpost



our pupils to help and support from mindfulness exercises to aspirational role models

Many pupils know which member of staff / team of staff can help them or their friends with their emotional or mental well-being and there has been a significant increase (8%) in pupils feeling that school staff listen to their concerns and know how to support them when they need help. Many pupils now understand where they can go to for help as compared to a majority of pupils in the previ-



Many pupils recognise that YBA takes part in national and local priorities to promote EHWB. The pupil survey demonstrated a significant increase in 'our school listens to pupil voice' from 48% of pupils to 78% of pupils agreeing with this statement. The further development of our school council and sub-committees have heightened the role of pupil voice at YBA and widened the opportunities for the pupil body to be involved in the variety of committees that have been developed. Our continued focus on a Trauma Informed Approach in the

school commu-

nity has helped staff to focus on building positive relationships. Due to the focus at YBA on a trauma informed approach and recognising that more qualified staff were needed to support this whole school drive, ensuring there was opportunity for pupils to access emotionally available adults, there are three newly qualified TiS Practitioners in school (in addition to our two from last academic year) who can support both staff and pupils. Timetabled interventions with this approach are now in place.



YBA continues to develop support for the school community's



wellbeing through a large variety of interventions such as trained staff and outside agency involvement examples being 1-1 support from school counsellor, group therapy work with the Youth Workers (HACK, ERLAS and social skills workshops). Other interventions include Family Engagement Officer, counselling support, school nurse, TAC, ELSA support with Jayne Hughes to SLO intervention. We have been working closely with the MindTheGap team and piloted a 'new' mentoring approach (MindTheGap have previously only worked with 16-25 age group). The review of this new approach does state that all students have shown an increase in


confidence, measured by engagement in activities, direct student feedback, TEDx performance,

reports from staff about student behaviour in the wider school. Most students display a sense of belonging within the group- measured by visible friendships forming, verbal feedback, behaviours and visual ownership of our space in school. Students also displayed an improved sense of self and each other. Parent feedback included '*The programme has been incredibly helpful with (Pupil) social anxiety and has provided an excellent outlet to help (pupil)*



manage and provide them with new coping techniques in their daily life'.

YBA has had a very active Facebook page, where information from school is shared, useful signposting for local agencies can been seen and pupil/school successes can be shared.

Teaching and Learning



At YBA we use direct teaching combined with effective AFL and impactful live feedback to support our learners to make progress and develop the knowledge and skills required. Following initial modelling, pupils are given structured tasks to practise applying the new skills or knowledge, culminating in independent work.

At YBA we aim for all students to fully engage with the learning process. As leaders of learning in the classroom we strive to engage, motivate, support, direct and assess learners as they progress in their learning.


Learning at YBA is viewed as pupils' development of knowledge and skills which reflect the ever -changing demands of the local and the wider global community our pupils are part of. At YBA there is a continual focus on improving the quality of provision both in and outside the classroom which supports all learners to become:

- ambitious, capable learners, ready to learn throughout their lives

How is Welsh Language and Culture promoted at YBA?

In July 2024 the Welsh Government published the new Welsh Language and Education Bill, aimed at giving every child in Wales a fair opportunity to speak Welsh independently and confidently, whatever their background or schooling. This supports the Welsh Government's target of 70% of learners are able to speak Welsh when they leave school by 2050.

YBA is an English-medium school which places community at the heart of everything it does. YBA is proud of its Welsh heritage and the benefits that learning Welsh can have for the future aspirations of our pupils. As a school we promote the benefits of being bi-lingual and celebrate key local and national events such as Gresford Disaster and St. David's Day. The Welsh Language and Culture within YBA is promoted by the Welsh Culture Student Committee.

At YBA our new curriculum for Wales has been carefully planned and each AOLE has clear links to Cynefin within each topic taught. For example, in Humanities pupils address key questions such as: Is Christianity still relevant in Wales today? Should Yr Wyddfa have changed its name? Welsh authors are promoted within English and key Welsh Artists are studied in Expressive Arts.

Our school is organised into six houses. Each house is represented by a key historical Welsh figure - Cadwaladr, Campbell, Glyndwr, Gwellian, Llywelyn and Morgan - Pupils and staff are assigned to a house to generate a sense of belonging to both YBA but also their Welsh heritage. Regular house competitions are run to promote collaboration and engagement with our local, national and international context.

Pupils at YBA understand the importance of learning Welsh, and its use is promoted throughout the school year through bi-lingual signage, all staff using agreed Welsh phrases within lessons, having AOLE Welsh Teaching Champions within each AOLE who use the target language of Welsh more frequently in their lessons. All pupils at YBA have the opportunity to learn Welsh, and Welsh Teachers at YBA provide an immersive experience within their classrooms with a clear focus on developing reading, writing, speaking and listening in Welsh. Our aim at YBA is that 80% of pupils leave YBA with a qualification in Welsh.

MAT Provision

YBA has a strong ethos of learning and achievement and this is underpinned by our values of "DREAM, REACH, ACHIEVE". As a school we recognise that each one of our learners has talents and skills which we aim to identify and nurture. It is our priority to develop the individual needs of all learners and an important extension of the aims, policies and ethos of the school is to recognise the needs of More Able and Talented learners and develop strategies for the identification, support and challenge of such learners.

At YBA we want all pupils to succeed and achieve their potential. At YBA we support MAT pupils through our:

- Curriculum Offer
- Challenging classroom based and home- learning activities.
- Extra-curricular opportunities
- YBA REACH Programme

In addition to the YBA Extra-curricular offering MAT pupils may be enrolled onto the SEREN Project or the Children's University Programme.

Year 7 MAT pupils were targeted to take part in the Children's University. This was an exciting scheme that encouraged and rewarded young people for



taking part in extracurricular and volunteering activities in their schools, their community and online, in order to raise aspirations, provide young people with new experiences, skills, friends and passions. It was run in partnership with Wrexham Glyndŵr University.

Wrexham's Healthy Schools Scheme was launched in 2002, and is a member of the Welsh Network of Healthy School Schemes. The scheme was accredited by the Welsh Assembly Government in 2003. The Scheme is a partnership between Health and Education, which recognises that there are mutual benefits in young people's health and attainments to be gained.

The scheme demonstrates commitment to supporting and encouraging the growth and implementation of the Personal and Social Education (PSE) framework in schools, in addition to ensuring that national health priorities are considered in the daily life of the school for pupils, staff and the wider community.

How are schools supported?

In Wrexham there is a team of officers dedicated to supporting schools in developing the healthy school scheme.

Schools are supported in developing actions to meet their identified needs, which are planned with clear achievement criteria and methods for monitoring and evaluation following the Ten Point Plan and working towards the National Quality Award. Local networking is facilitated between schools and health organisations and training opportunities are made available for staff.


Typically schools undertake an assessment annually and are accredited for each year of successful participation in the scheme. Schools are awarded their plaque/certificate at the annual celebration event.

The catering team at Ysgol Bryn Alyn provide a wide range of nutritionally balanced menu choices throughout the day for all our pupils, using basic wholesome ingredients. Our menus comply with the nutritional standards for school

lunches set by the Welsh Government. We comply with the new regulations for allergens with allergen information at each till point.

There is a three week cycle menu which includes vegetarian choices; packed lunches are also available on request. There is a pre order facility which helps cut down waiting time for pupils.







Additional Needs Provision

Ms Jasmin Morgan, the Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator (ALNco) and the Learning Support Team provide support for students with Additional Learning Needs.

Support is provided for pupils in mainstream lessons as well as small group and one-to-one provision. A wide variety of additional needs is catered for, ranging from medical, learning, speech and language, ASD, emotional and social difficulties.

The school works closely with other professionals such as the Educational Psychologist, Behaviour Support, Speech Therapists and the School Nurse to ensure that the individual needs of the pupils are met.

Regular review meetings are held, involving all parties concerned, to assess, monitor progress and establish new targets and individual plans.

We have excellent links with cluster Primary Schools to help ensure a smooth and successful transition for ALN pupils.
